The book for **August** is San Francisco, Salvadoran-American journalist Roberto Lovato's *Unforgetting, A Memoir of Family, Migration, Gangs, and Revolution in the Americas.* Lovato moves back and forth in time between 1932 and 2015 and in place between El Salvador and Los Angeles, giving us a complex view of US and Central American life. "What is *Unforgetting*---a coming of age story, a thriller, a slice of hemispheric history? ... untangles the tightly woven skein of love and terror that connects El Salvador and the United States." The book for **September** will be **The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics**_by Daniel James Brown. "... a fine-grained portrait of the Depression era, with its economic and climatic horrors set against youthful dreams. ... nine rangy boys – sons of farmers, fishermen, and loggers – who managed to coalesce into a rowing team that would march confidently into the 1936 Olympics under the hawkish eyes of Hitler."
